## **SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS**

What is Biblical Hope? In our ordinary uses of "hope", we express uncertainty: "I hope dad gets home soon". But this is not the Biblical meaning of hope. Biblical hope is not just a desire for something good in the future, but rather, Biblical hope is a confident expectation and desire for something good in the future. And it not only expects it to happen; it is confident that it will happen because it is based on the character and promises of God.
